Dear Missionaries:

It appears that there has emerged in the Mission a new spirit, a new attitude, and a new type of dedication. The faith and diligence of this "new missionary" is not unlike that of the successful missionaries in Book of Mormon times.

Sister Hansen and I are now concluding another series of mission-wide conferences with missionaries and members and we are humbly grateful to be here in the mission field while you are here. Your individual testimonies and your collective efforts are a great inspiration to us and we fully realize how your parents must feel about you.

The month of February was a great success because more districts than ever before achieved or "nearly achieved" their challenge. The reason for success seems to center around district unity, district love, and district diligence.

Some districts have raised their average "effective-time" hours to an incredible high, knowing full well that if they were to achieve as a district they would have to work hard as a district. Other districts have decided that before they permit themselves any periods of "relaxation", they will have first assured themselves that the challenge is within reach. And the emphasis is still on complete families, fathers first.

Since we have been in the Mission, the highest "average number of baptisms per missionary" has been 1.83. The Book of Mormon missionaries may have walked these same streets with much the same message. But they would not have received, nor did they deserve any more blessings from on high than you do.

May we continue to be worthy of wonderful blessings.


We extend our congratulations to Elder Chad Wright. During the month of February, he averaged 76 hours effective time per week and gave an average of six first lessons.

## SUGGESTIONS FOR SMALL TOWNS

Because of the number of new missionaries in the Mission, many of the elders are now working in small towns in both Guatemala and El Salvador. Elders Brown and Jones, the Zone Supervisors in Guatemala, have developed some helpful techniques to help spread the gospel in these smaller communities. These suggestions may be used and developed by the elders in their own particular areas.

### I Talent Shows, MIA Dances, Fiestas, and Outings:

The elders working through the branches and closely with the individual organizations could find one or all of these programs useful in finding new investigators.

- A. Programs such as these could be held on a mutual night as a mutual activity, thus employing the talents of the local members. The members could be in charge of all such activities but the elders would have to push the programs and give help when needed.
- B. Advertizing is essential and should be done well in advance. (about two weeks) The mutual members could be of great help by making and passing out posters, contacting radio stations etc.
- C. The Relief Society could be contacted and asked to make and serve refreshments. Referral slips with room for name and address should be passed out to each investigator present. They should be collected as the investigators leave. These papers can then be used to find the person at home and speak with them more about the church.
- D. An elder might give a short gospel message at the intermission.

### II Sports Events: Ping Pong, Basquetbol, Fútbol:

- A. A branch fútbol or basquetbol team might be formed of the local members to compete with the local town teams. This would serve to spread the Mormon name and make the town people more receptive to you when you tract them out. Also references would be obtained at the games.
- B. Ping pong games might be organized so that the elders may get closer to the youth. They could get references from the participating members and make friends with the non-members so that they can set up visits with them in their homes and meet the rest of the family.



C. Advertizing is always a necessity.

### III Sidewalk Displays:

- A. Sidewalk displays might be used to create interest and acquire references.
- B. A series of four or five different short messages could be given by means of pictures and a short discription or presentation. One elder would give the presentation while the other mingled in the crowd and picked up references from interested persons. The lessons could cover Mormon exodus, restoration, Joseph Smith, Organization of the true Church, etc.
- C. Pamphlets would be handed out during the presentation. At noon on a busy street corner, the display could be set up or on a sunday afternoon in the park.

### IV Missionary Committee:

- A. The youth of the church are a strong missionary tool when formed into a committee. They might also split up with the missionaries at night to make them twice as effective.

### V Films:

- A. Films such as, Pabellón Mormón, Ventanas de los Cielos and others could be shown in the Mutual and used as a missionary tool.

### VI Civic Leaders, Schools, Churches:

- A. The film presentation that was used in Guatemala City could be shown to the leaders of the community to show how Mormonism is helping in the developement of Guatemala.

### VII Part Member Families and Relatives:

- A. Elders might contact the part-member families and teach the gospel to the non-member part. Also the members might refer you to their close relatives who are interested.
- B. Try to make the members realize the importance of taking the gospel to their families.



# TO SPEAK LIKE A NATIVE

## FIRST WEEK

1. Drill the exercises that stress the difference between the Imperfect and the Preterite, 312-313. Read aloud to your companion for his constructive criticism.
2. The use of the definite article is very common in Spanish. Practice the exercises with Abstract Noun, 313, with Names of Language, 314, with Days and Places, 314, with Chapter and Verse, 315, with Titles, 315, non-use in Direct Address, 316, with Nouns used in a General Sense, 316, with Things Possessed, 317.
3. Memorize the door approach, La Beata, 319. And use it in your daily endeavors.

## SECOND WEEK

1. The Subjunctive in affirmative and negative Direct Commands, 325, is frequently bothersome to missionaries. Study carefully the presentation and do the drills, 326-27.
2. The "If" clause must be thoroughly understood if one desires fluency. Do the drills, 327-28. If time permits read aloud to companion.
3. Lo with an Adjective, 329, and with an Adverb, 329, and with Ser and Estar, 330, are important concepts. Do the drills and make sure you understand them.

## THIRD WEEK

1. The Future Tense, 330, should already be mastered. Do the exercises, 331-32. The Present with Future Meaning, 332, is very common in Spanish. Be certain that you understand it and are able to do the exercises, 332.

2. Memorize the Word of Wisdom conversation, 334, and try to use it in your daily work.
  3. Whether you realize it or not, you now have completed ESPAÑOL PARA MISIONEROS for the umpteenth time. If your Spanish is now without error, you deserve sincere congratulations (!) from the authors. If not, they suggest that you consider another review based on the lessons prepared for and printed in the AVANTE.

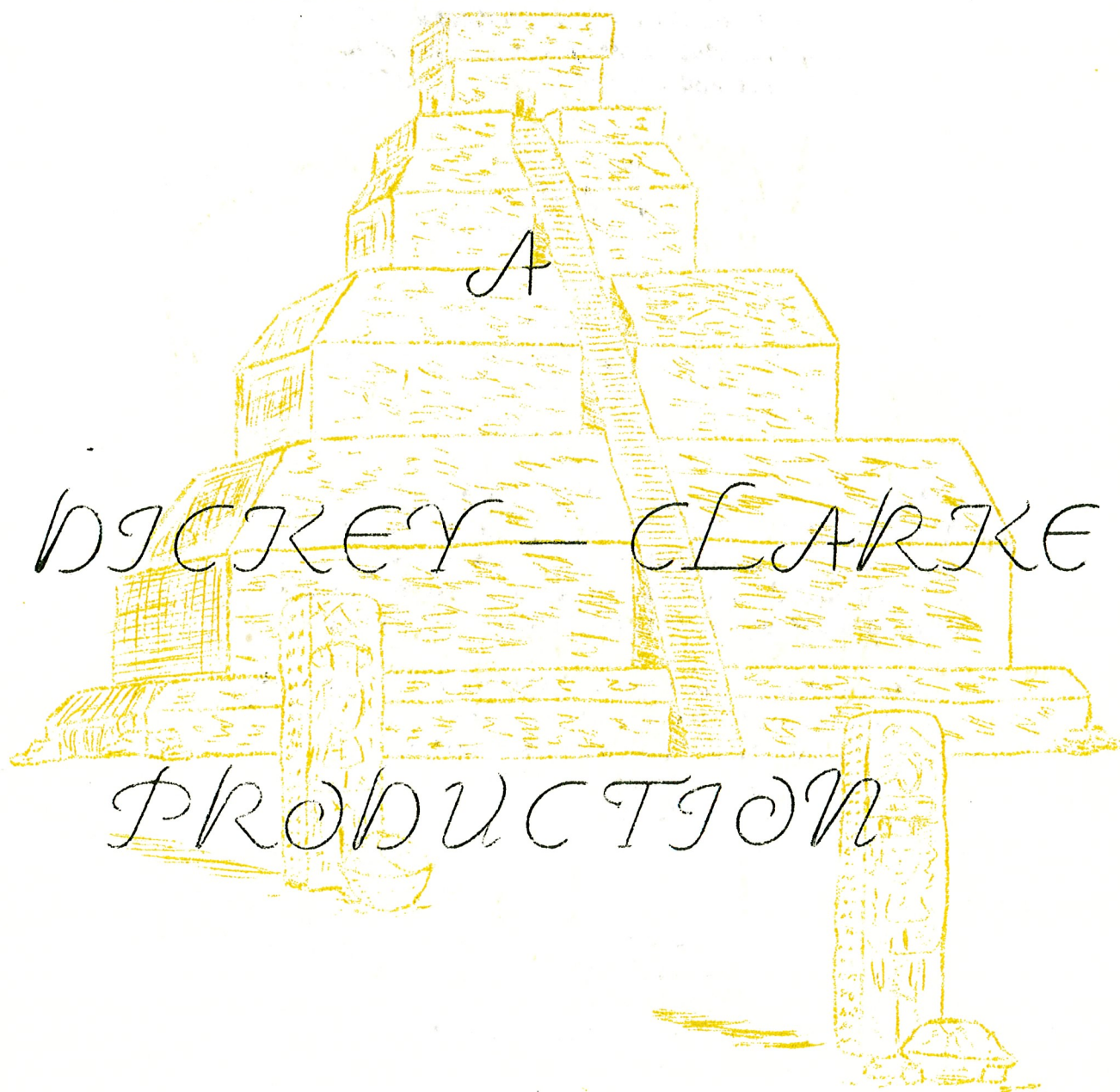
