
LA MISION GUATEMALTECO-SALVADOREÑA







Dear Fellow Missionaries:

The question is often asked and sometimes confusion arises about whom to baptize. The only obvious answer would seem to be that since we are all children of our Father in Heaven, everyone of a sound mind should have an opportunity to hear and to be taught the gospel.

In order to motivate our desires to baptize and help create within us a want to carry the gospel message to all of God's children and to help each of us to better organize our time, the individual districts in the Mission set a "challenge". This goal is always meant to be a realistic one and, therefore, should be within reach of each pair of missionaries.

Any person baptized is a "number" and sometimes the idea may exist that it matters not whom we baptize as long as the "number" is attained. This is a fallacy.

The needs of the Mission, and for that matter, the entire Church, center around the complete family. The Church emphasis is always on the integral unit of society, the family. It is for this reason that the Mission some time ago issued the challenge to all missionaries to find, wherever possible, a family a day. And many missionaries do not let a day go by without first having found a new family.

It is one thing to baptize people. It is another thing to organize the Church with the people who are baptized. We do not confer the priesthood on young ladies (nor old ones) nor do they ever become branch presidents. Our need for the moment is not for women unless they are a part of a family which would always include the father. It seems important to establish the fact that we organize the Church with the people whom the missionaries baptize and if some of our branches appear to be weak, it is only because a stronger element has yet to be baptized.

The need for fathers, men on whom we are able to confer the priesthood and use to structure the Church, is great. Time spent in teaching women (and girls) might better be spent searching for and finding men who are part of the complete family. A man who is already a leader in his work or in his profession is just that much better qualified to help in the Church.

Humble yourselves and be worthy to ask and receive the Lord's help and He will direct you to complete families.

Mission Presidents' Seminar in Mexico City during the middle of June will be attended by President and Sister Hansen.

The last month was a disgusting one for the medical profession. Contrary to the history of years past, the period didn't contain a single new case of hepatitis among the 127 Guatemala-El Salvador Elders. Thanks go to Sister Hansen for her careful surveillance of the Elders' schedule of gamma gobulin shots and to President (Doctor) Hansen for his help in giving shots. It has been heard that the President has enjoyed "getting close to his Elders".

The upcoming months' missionary meetings are scheduled as follows: May 19-20---Missionary Interviews-Gran Hotel, San Salvador

May 21 8:30 A.M. Fast and testimony meeting---new San Salvador Chapel June 2-3---Missionary interviews-Guate. City

June 4--- Fast and Testimony Meeting---Branch #2, Guate. City The Indian and Quezaltenango districts will participate in similar meetings during the first part of July.

First in a series of recent releases was the departure of Elders Howard and Walker on April 30. In pouring rain, Elder Paul Sorenson left for his home in Idaho Falls, Idaho a few days ago.

It seems that Elder S. was persuaded to give a final lesson the afternoon of his departure. He looked truly like a returning missionary: ie., polished shoes, clean suit and shirt, and new, dark, conservative tie. He couldn't believe the big black cloud that came up, opened, and dumped a generous quantity of water over the fleeing elder. He was taken to the mission home, wrapped in a towel, and while his suit was in a dryer and his shoes placed in front of the presidential heater, he was left to wonder what was to be of his wet, conservative, "going home" tie. Every story has a happy ending and Elder Sorenson was aware of his when he looked down from his plane seat and saw the land slip quickly away.

And, by the time this copy of the Avante is being read, Elders Dickey, Feldman and Myers will be making their last transfer. While the Guatemala-El Salvador Mission's foundation may not "quiver, shake, and collapse", as predicted by some, the example of these fine missionaries will be highly missed.

According to Sister Hansen, in the future, all missionaries will be responsible to get their gamma gobulin booster every three months. The El Salvador elders will receive one reminder from the Zone Leaders. "If disregarded and hepatitis is contracted, the missionary will be required to pay his own bill." The office will be responsible for contacting the elders and giving shots in Guatemala.

Mission Leaders' Seminary was held in the mission home during the past month. Each missionary received the invitation to send questions and/or suggestions through his District Leader. After the week-end sessions, each district held a meeting where the activities, decisions and experiences were discussed among all of the elders.



Have you ever paused and wondered where you would be and what you would be doing in ten years from now? Or have you ever pondered over what great events transpired ten years ago? The following is offered with the hope of helping you "Look Back."

THE ORIGIN OF OUR MISSION:

September 1946: With the advice of John F. O'Donnal, a member who was then working with rubber plantation experiments in Honduras and Guatemala, the President of the Mexican Mission visited the Central American Countries.

July 1947: The Central American Countries were added to the Mexican Mission.

August 1947: Four missionaries were assigned to work in this new addition.

November 13, 1948: The first baptismal service was held in Guatemala when Mrs. O'Donnal and her two daughters became members.

March 2,1951: The first baptismal service was celebrated in San Salvador when Ana Villaseñor and eleven more "went under."

November 1952: The Central American Mission was organized with Gordon M. Romney presiding.

July 31, 1965: The Central American Mission was divided with President Teddy E. Brewerton called to lead the Central American Mission and President Hansen remained at the helm of the newly named Guatemala-El Salvador Mission.

TO SEE OUR MISSION PROGRESS WE COUNT NUMBERS (STATISTICS) From the first member in 1948 the growth was slow with only 241 members in Guatemala in March, 1956. Then, we grew like a "weed." In 1963 there were 12,000 members, and in July when we "split" there were 18,360 members in 45 branches organized in 10 districts with 217 missionaries. And today with only two countries the growth is still impressive. There are 15, 400 members in 7 districts with 35 branches and 120 missionaries. With about half the number of missionaries working harder than ever the baptismal statistics compare as follows: LAST YEAR TO DATE: 878. THIS YEAR 654. And for leadership material in the branches we have 280 Melchizedek Priesthood bearers assisted by the Aaronic Priesthood with 878 over 21 and 616 "jovenes" who are priesthood holders

WE HAVE BEEN BUILDING TOO! The Guatemala Branch #2 was the first started in the mission on July 6, 1950. We now have 8 Church owned chapels: Retalhuleu, Quezaltenango, Patzicía, Guatemala 2, 1-3, 4-10, Santa Ana and San Salvador. With four more to be started this year and 4 the next we will double the chapels by 1968.


