
# LA MISION GUATEMALTECO-SALVADOREÑA

#### Dear Fellow Missionaries:

From the standpoint of missionary effort and district achievement last month (July) was one of our very best months! The most significant item was the increase in the number of complete family baptisms. Twenty-seven complete families were baptized and 37 other families were completed as additional family members were baptized. People of prominence are now becoming part of the Kingdom in this mission. Sister Hansen and I congratulate each and everyone of you for your diligence, your dedication, and your constancy!

Missionaries often ask the question, "How long shall we go on teaching a family?" We have always answered, "As long as there is evidence to expect that the family will understand and be baptized." The missionary plan is a wonderful, inspired way to teach. The missionary's testimony is the one way to bear witness not only to all of the basic teachings of the plan but to convince the new family that they, too, are children of our Heavenly Father, that he loves them enough to bring a personal witness to their door.

Brother John L. Harmer has said, "It makes a mockery of the Gospel, and defeats the purpose of the missionary's labors, if he allows himself to spend his time teaching those who are not willing to make the sacrifice necessary to accept the gospel.

Such a doctrine may seem harsh, but in reality it is the only fair approach to take. Consider the injustice that is done to those who would have accepted the Gospel but did not get a chance to hear it, because the missionary spent so much time teaching it to those who were never going to accept it. For some reason missionaries continue meeting with people who simply have not the true characteristics of valid investigators. There is no excuse for this, and it is laziness to keep on doing it. Once he has given his witness and testimony, the only reason for the missionary to remain is if there is some very real possibility that the listener will accept the gospel."

The real hunger here in Guatemala and El Salvador does not exist because people are too poor to eat. Fresh fruit and vegetables and meat abound in the public markets. And these items are always within reach of a family that is willing to work and thereby earn an honorable living. The true hunger is for the gospel of Jesus Christ that brings knowledge, honor, and dignity to every man and his family. There are approximately seven million people in the mission waiting to hear your message.

May our Heavenly Father bless us all with an abiding love for these people sufficient to motivate us to yet greater heights.

Not many days after a missionary has returned home, he receives from his Bishop a certificate which states the following: "This certifies that you are honorably released from your appointment as a missionary in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. For this reason, let us never become like the fly and involve ourselves in the telestial pleasures that surround us but maintain our thinking and living on a Celestial level.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

That "despedida" dinners have never been suggested nor authorized by the Church Missionary Committee. They are most improper at transfer time. And they certainly are not "effective time" activities when a missionary leaves the mission. There is nothing social about a call to serve.

At the time a missionary finishes his mission he is always invited to dinner as a very special guest in the Mission Home. And the president and his wife, when they have the time, may even accompany him to the airport.

That there is published monthly a "calendario" in the LIAHONA and that anyone and everyone who may be teaching or be asked to teach the "INVESTIGATOR CLASS" should not do so without prior consultation with the Branch President or the Sunday School Superintendent as to which lesson has been assigned for a given Sunday. Everyone in the Church in the Mission follows the schedule of this "calendario."

That all new Elders who have never worked in Guatemala should get a VISA DE CONVENIO good for two years when they come to Guatemala. Having a VISA DE CONVENIO makes it possible to renew the permission to stay in the country. Otherwise problems can arrise and there is a possibility of having a fine put on your passport.

That all reports and baptismal slips and white 110 FP cards should be in the office by the 5th of each month. Otherwise no credit can be given. Also all D.L.'s should put on the back side of the white card as well as on the back of the yellow baptismal slip who is to receive credit.

That the mission office is unable to mail packages home for missionaries. Too many things can happen causing problems for the owner of the package as well as for the office staff.

#### QUALITIES OF A WELL-PREPARED MISSIONARY

#### 1. Vision

He will have clearly in mind his purpose as a missionary, and he thoroughly dedicated to fulfilling that responsibility and calling.

#### 2. Sincerity

His actions and desires will never be falsified for the achievement of any goal, no matter how worthy it may seem. With both companion and investigator he will ever be intellectually and spiritually honest.

#### 3. Humility and meekness

Humility being defined as the capacity to be taught and willingness to forget self. Meekness being defined as the capacity to conform his will to the will of His Father-in-Heaven, and in this case, to the counsel of the mission authorities.

#### 4. Initiative

He will seek for opportunity, instead of waiting for it to come to him.

#### 5. Courage

If necessary he will endure (without complaint) personal discomfort to his person and other inconveniences that may be placed before him in order to be more effective in giving the gospel to others.

#### 6. Honesty

He will be honest above question in the matter of missionary reports, person! debts, and representations of fact.

#### 7. Enthusiasm

He will approach his labors in eager anticipation of the great work that he is doing without appearing childish in his expression of enthusiasm.

#### 8. Leadership

He will recognize the talents and abilities of his companions, and will give them due honor for same. If called upon to lead in some responsible position he will inspire others by his own actions, and coordinate and guide their efforts for maximum effectiveness.

#### 9. Cheerfulness

He will be cheerful without undue lightmindedness or frivolity.

#### 10. Love

He will gain a sincere love for the people, and be capable of giving his all for the blessing and benefit of those he serves.

#### 11. Friendliness

He will add to the unity and love of a district, and will mix willingly and well with all of his fellow missionaries.

#### 12. Cleanliness

His physical person and actions will represent at all times the sacredness of his calling and solemnity of being a representative of Christ. An unclean body, unkept cloth, and scuffling with companions in public are as foreign to his nature as smoking would be.

13. Adaptability

He will find the pleasures of each day's activity and needs, without looking on to the distant transfer or trip home, or living in the past of college life, by day dreaming and other escape mechanism activity.

14. Charitability

He will desire to do good when and where he can, irrespective of who gets the honor.

15. Ability to Teach

He will consciously strive to improve himself in his ability to teach, adapt to situations, and in every way show earnest preparation in all facets of the calling he has.

16. Service

He will work hard, not for status on comparative reports or in the eyes of others, but with a desire to serve his fellow men as his only motive.

17. Respect

He will support those in authority over him.

18. Devotion

His decisions will be motivated by the thought of "what is best for the Lord's work?" instead of, "what is best for my personal desires."

19. Reverence

He will never cease to be humbled with the realization that he works for the spiritual salvation of the souls of men.

20. Knowledge

He will diligently work to gain an adequate knowledge of the Gospel, that he might become more powerful in presenting the Gospel plan. He will not spend time studying commentaries and building a large notebook except as it aids directly his ability to proselyte the Gospel.

21. Simplicity and Balance

He will have achieved a sense of balance in his missionary character or personality, so as to remain in tune with the spirit of his calling, and yet not be too one-sided in his personality.

22. Organization

He will use every tool made available to him to gain the maximum amount of activity and productive effort from the days and weeks he labors.

23. Concentration

He will have burning within him the knowledge that he has been called of God, and will have exhaused his every effort in accomplishing the purpose for which God placed him in the mission field.
