


LA MISION GUATEMALTECA SALVADOREÑA



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Dear Fellow Missionaries:

Peter once asked the question: "What manner of people ought ye to be?"
(II Peter 3:11) And the missionary answer ought to be: "I am the best missionary in this mission." It would appear obvious that this is the sort of an opinion that one shares with himself and he simply proves its truth by his example.

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I have recently concluded another series of interviews and/or lengthy meetings with all the missionaries in the mission. Yes, we did lose ten leaders at the beginning of the month. But we gained ten more. And the present ten are trying to prove that they are even better than the last ones. There are already evident results. I have repeatedly told everyone that the caliber of missionary assigned to this mission is becoming better all the time. The desire to work is continuously more noticeable. And the results show it.

Now I am not so naive as to believe that we are all perfect and that each of us does not have something to overcome. That is why we are here in the mission field. It is a shock and a surprise to find out, upon arriving, that missionary work is actually so hard, and that most missionaries are actually willing to spend all their time searching for complete families. These missionaries are happy and they have no regrets. They are fulfilling the call that brought them to Central America to help our Heavenly Father preach the gospel message to all of His children.

The best missionary in this mission obeys all the rules. He gets up at 6:00 a.m. and has study class with his companion. He schedules his time around the time when the men and the families are home in his area. He studies the gospel. He converts himself. He grows in the gospel. He writes about his inspirational moments to his parents or his guardians. He is humble and he constantly seeks spirituality. He is guided by the Holy Ghost because of his love for the gospel, his love for his companion, and his love for the people. He is worthy to have his prayers answered. He attends no social functions nor parties. He confines his reading to the Standard Works and other approved Church books. He is always perfecting his ability to speak Spanish. He seeks opportunity to bear his testimony to families in their own, individual homes. He is almost perfect.

The Doctrine and Covenants (108:99,100) reminds us: "Wherefore, now let every man learn his duty, and to act in the office in which he is appointed, in all diligence. He that is slothful shall not be counted worthy to stand."

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Dear Fellow Missionaries:

It is a pleasure for me to be serving with you in this great work of the Lord. As a mission we set challenges, we work hard, and we realize goals. We all know what to do and, to a greater or lesser degree, know how to do it, but most important we must know why. Alvin R. Dyer once said to a group of missionaries, "I would feel rather embarrassed as a leader of the Church if anyone of our missionaries did not know why he is in the mission field. If you were asked the question as to why you were here and what you were doing in the mission and all you could say is that, 'I am here preaching the gospel and I have been sent out here. I know the gospel is true, and I have a testimony of it.' If that is all you could say, you don't have a full meaning of the purpose of missionary work."

A faithful servant serves willingly and is blessed by the Lord. But as understanding and knowledge are added to his service heterally becomes a "friend" of the Lord. Then he may look for the time when the Lord shall say, "I say unto you... ye are my friends." (Doc. & Cov. 84:63) May the Lord help us all to understand more fully the wonderful call with which we have been entrusted.

- ** On September 9th, Elder Bates and Jones left San Salvador returning home via the Mission Office. Both elders were worked over the day before; Elder Jones by a new companion fresh from the States, and Elder Bates by an enthusiastic new Zone Leader.
- ** With the change in Mission leadership, the elders in San Salvador are now headed with Elders L. Neil Johnson and Don Christiansen as Zone Leaders; and Elders Bruce Erickson, William Morby, Stephen Wright, Clyde Allred, Lamar Orton, and James Lambson, who serve as District Leaders.
- ** The Church membership of El Salvador faces an historical "first" with the upcoming visit on September 18th, of Brother and Sister Parmley of Salt Lake City. Sister Parmley serves as President of the Primary Association of the Church. Brother Parmley is a member of the General Board of the Sunday School. The visit of the Church leaders, who are coming from stake conference in Sao Paulo, Brazil, is the first in the 7 year history of the El Salvador District.
- ** Missionaries in El Salvador attended, this month, a special conference with President and Sister Hansen in the recently constructed chapel in the Colonia Layco. During the meeting in the new building, which is becoming rapidly well-known in the capital, it was noted that the missionary work results indicated a high increase in complete family baptisms and in the number of men being baptized. According to the President, "Only through such results will the dream of a Salvador, and Guatemala Stake become a reality."
- ** On September 8th, Brother and Sister Albert E. Mitchell arrived in San Salvador- their first assignment in the Mission. The Mitchells, who are from Houston, Texas, have lived in Venezuela and Argentina for 14 years while working for the Esso-Standard Company. Not to be outdone by younger missionaries, Brother and Sister Mitchell have just completed 3 months in the Language Training Mission in Provo.
- ** Someone said that a truck from the Guatemala Biltmore Hotel was seen down at Central Market loading up with some lettuce to make the famous "Chef's Salad". Speaking of restaurants, they say that business at the "Lisette" hasn't been up to par lately. (con't)

- ** Friday, Guatemala waved good-bye to ten teary elders as they swooped out into unknown horizons; B.Y.U.? marriage!!?? President and Sister Hansen say that the very best "elder" we lost was when Terry, Jr., left on a luggageless trip to Provo (and B.Y.U., of course) via L.A. and S.F. (his luggage stayed at the Guatemala Airport).
- ** The famous meeting between the only two Presidents in Guatemala came off smoothly, even if meanwhile, a few impatient army colonels had to wait. The same week, Brother Hector Grillone of Radio New York was through here on a tour of Latin America to promote a cultural exCMANGE; Mormonism instead of Catholicism.

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- ** Several districts have now had the chance (thanks to their hard work to make CHALLENGE) to see some interesting ruins in the outlying parts of Guatemala. Let's see if we can't raise our CHALLENGE, at the same time, raising our many rewards.
- ** Congratulations go to Guatemala districts #1, #5, #6, and Quiché for having attained their respective CHALLENGE for the month of August. Sisters Manwaring and Jim are to be especially congratulated for their 8 baptisms.
- ** They say now, that a "family a day", keeps the President away.
