

As we labor here together in this BOOK OF MORMON area it seems important to stress the fact that the BOOK OF MORMON is one of our greatest proselyting tools, and that we should continue to read it during the entire length of our mission.

During my interviews with all of the missionaries it is not difficult to discern, as does Alma in the BOOK OF MORMON (Alma 17) which missionaries: "were still his brethren in the Lord; yea and they had waxed strong in the knowledge of the truth; for they were men of a sound understanding and they had searched the scriptures diligently, that they might know the word of God."

Perhaps no single verse in the BOOK OF MORMON is more appropriate for missionaries than the one which follows the quotation above: "But this is not all; they had given themselves to much prayer, and fasting; therefore they had the spirit of prophecy, and the spirit of revelation, and when they taught, they taught with power and authority of God."

During the recent Mission Presidents: Seminar in Mexico City, Elder Marion G. Romney of the Council of the Twelve was most emphatic in stating that all missionaries should continually study and ponder the great gospel truths that are presented in the BOOK OF MORMON. This accumulated knowledge will then help every missionary to understand and to know for a certainty the answer to the questions: "Why are you have in the mission field?"

It seems to me that our daily 6:30 morning gospel study class should appropriately be a discussion period during which questions encountered in individual reading assignments might be properly answered. In other words, it almost seems to be a waste of time to read to each other (during the study class) either in Spanish or in English from the BCLK OF MORMON. I should like to propose that you read individually and silently a certain number of pages in the BOOK OF MORMON, this assignment to vary according to the preparation of the pair of missionaries, and the questions be written down and then fully discussed. Perhaps the first half hour of the class might be devoted to individual (silent) reading, and in the missionaries' native language, and then the last half might be more properly used as a question-answer period.

May the Lord bless and protect each of us according to our worthiness and our devotion to the Church.

HAVE I BEEN DOING IT

CORRECTLY?

This article is to help the elders to understand the proper procedure in filling out recommendation slips for baptisms.

The name of the branch should always be in full (Guatemala #2).

The Latin people always take the names of both parents, the father's first and then the mother's name. The only exception is when the father is not married, and then the person will only take the mother's name.

When a woman gets married she drops her mother's name and adds the name of her husband with the word "de". (María Gomez de López)

Their home address should be filled out in full with the zone, city, and country.

Both parents names should be specified, even though the father may not be recognized (married), then the words (not recognized) should be added after his name.

The birth date should be complete along with the place of birth. This information is very important.

The date of baptism should be clearly written (neatly) along with the FULL name of the elders.

On the back side, the name of the wife or husband should be included, member or not. The date of the marriage should be filled in along with the city in which they were married. The necessary information should be filled in if they have died or been divorced. If they have not been married, add after their names (not married).

If there are more than two (2) marriages or relationships which involve the birth of children, a list of all children and their parents should be added on a separate sheet of paper.

The names of all children should be written in the proper place. If a child has died at birth or any time after birth, list after their name the date of death.

All this information should help the elders to understand the importance of the correctly prepared baptism certificate, because all this information is forwared to Salt Lake City.

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MESA TEMPLE TRIP- With about 25 members from El Salvador and 145 from Guatemala, 3 buses left from the Mission Home on November 12th on the first leg of the over 4000 mile journey to the House of the Lord in Mesa, Arizona. The brothers and sisters participating in this, the second of such excursions from Central America, have made many personal sacrifices to have been able to go. Complete families such as that of Brother Miguel Batz from Totonicapán, will participate in the sealing ordinances. Many pure Lamanites are included. After a short stay, the group will head back arriving about December 1st.

NEW DISTRICT FORMED IN GUATEMALA- On Sunday, November 6th, at a special conference held in Guatemala City, the Guatemala Districts #'s 1 and 2 were dissolved to make a single district which will be called the Guatemala District. The new District President is Udine Falabella, formerly 1st Counselor in 3 Mission Presidency. Brother Falabella's 1st Counselor is Eduardo Molina. The two former districts were combined in order to achieve a more uniform system of organization so that it will meet the needs of the future.

SICKNESS AMONG MISSIONARIES- Hepatitus is no longer a problem among the missionaries of this mission. With systematic encounters with gamma gobulin and good health practices, this once menacing disease hasn't found any victims among Guatemala-El Salvador elders. A problem frequently arises when an elder is sick for some reason and isn't acquainted with the best doctors. Recommended are Dr. Herrera in Guatemala City, and Dr. Palomo in San Salvador.

VISITORS FROM SALT LAKE CITY-Brother and dister Vernon Sharp, on their first stop of a tour of Latin American missions, visited Guatemala City for a few days. Members heard them speak at a conference on November 8th. Sister Sharp is on the Relief Society General Board, and Brother Sharp is a member of the Priesthood Genealogical Committee of the Church. In his youth, he was one of the first missionaries to go to South America.

DID YOU KNOW.....

- -that district leaders are to be sure to put the names of the elders who are to receive credit for the baptism on the back side of the respective 110-FP card?
- -that everyone should make sure to get a 24 month "Visa de Convenio" from the El Salvador Consulate when on a passport change from El Salvador? This will eliminate having to come all the way to Guatemala City on every passport change. Every passport change before it is taken must be cleared through the zone leader 2 weeks before.
- -that almost every elder owes the Mission for a gamma gobulin shot? Would you please settle your account?
- -that due to a recent arrangement with a Guatemala City lawyer who has offered his services free to the missionaries, visa renewal charges for elders having been in Guatemala more than three months has been reduced to \$1.70?

Dear Mama,

This is your dear missionary son, finally getting around to writing to you. This is my first week as a missionary and already I am beginning to feel like a different person. I have gained five pounds, worn out two sets of knuckles knocking on doors, and my shoe size is now two larger than it was before.

But I am enjoying my work very much. A missionary's day is so full of wonderful activities, let me tell you of some of them.

A missionary's day begins at 6:00 a.m. not five minutes after 6:00, but at 6:00. The alarm rings and my companion and I leap out of bed ready to begin the day. However, our apartment is always cold, so at 6:01 we leap back into bed and stay there for another hour.

At 7:00 we come to the sudden realization that the Supervising Elder might be in the district so we leap out of bed once more. We take out our "sticks" and begin studying. Perhaps you will not understand what is meant by "sticks." It is the missionary expression for the Bible and the Book of Mormon. I'm still not certain where this came from, but I believe it originated with Adam and Eve. At least I'm sure they knew something about sticks as they named their son Cain, which is a walking stick.

But back to studying. I enjoy it very much and my companion is such a wonderful teacher. The first study class we held he told me I was a moron. I said of course I was, I had been all my life. I was baptized a moron when I was eight years old.

When study class was over, we ate breakfast. I cooked it. When we were finished my companion said that I should concentrate on memorizing a scripture from the Old Testament, I Sam. 15:22, which says, "..."Hath the Lord as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices, as in obeying the voice of the Lord?" I don't get the connection.

Our first few hours each day are spent in tracting. I've always thought they meant tracting, but now I find that it isn't the word at all. What they meant was attracting. We attracted every dog in the neighborhood.

In the afternoon we held a cottage meeting. A man asked me why our church practiced polygamy when the scriptures so clearly stated it was wrong to do so. I asked him to show me the scripture and he did. It is Matt. 6:24 which says, "No man can serve two masters."

Before going to bed I wrote the following in tribute to my companion. He is such a nice guy.

He maketh me to rise early in the morning; he causeth me to stay up late at night. He teacheth me the gospel and leadeth me by the hand into the tracting area and forceth me to take every other door. Yea, though I walk through the alleys where dogs bark and follow me I will fear no evil for he is with me. His soothing words they comfort me, he speaketh softhly but carrieth a big stick. He prepareth a table before me, but neglecteth the cooking, the pot boileth over. He annointest my head with Toni home wave — Oops, how did that get in there? Surely, goodness his influence shall follow me all the days of my life and I shall dwell in the madhouse forever.

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Once there were four neighbors who lived side by side. Their names were: Fred Somebody, Thomas Everybody, Pete Anybody and Joe Nobody. They were not like you and me. They were very odd people and it was difficult to understand them as well as the things they did. The way they lived was a shame and everybody knew it. For example: Somebody talked about his neighbors, and Everybody was afraid to do something because Somebody might find out. Nobody should have told Everybody there was nothing to worry about. But Anybody knew that Everybody was talking about Somebody too, so he was just getting what he deserved.

Really, it wasn't a very pleasant neighborhood. I don't think you would have enjoyed living there. There was the time Anybody's house caught fire. Everybody thought that Somebody had called the fire department and Somebody thought Everybody had done it, so it turned out that Nobody called the fire department, and Anybody suffered quite a loss.

All four belonged to the same Church. I don't think you would have enjoyed having them in your Church. Everybody went fishing on Sunday. Anybody wanted to worship, but wasn't a very friendly person himself and was sure that Somebody wouldn't speak to him, so Nobody went to church. Nobody was the only decent one of the four. Nobody was very faithful. Nobody helped the Bishop. Nobody sang in the choir, and Nobody passed the Sacrament. In fact, everything that was needed in the church Nobody did it. For instance, they needed a Sunday School teacher; Everybody thought that Anybody would teach, but Somebody would not do it, so guess who finally did it? That's right, Nobody.

It happened that a fifth neighbor came to live among them. He was an unbeliever and Everybody thought Somebody should try to convert him. Anybody could have at least made an effort. In the end who do you suppose finally did teach him the Gospel? You are right, Nobody did.

Now it came to pass that all four died and where did they end up? Well, Everybody stood before the judgement seat of Christ and had no defense. Anybody should have pleaded their case, but they thought sure Somebody would save them. Somebody didn't. Which of the four finally got to Heaven? Oh, you are right again Nobody did.


ATTITUDE

I. Necessary attributes of a good missionary (D.&C. 4)

- A. Desire--you can do nothing without desire. If you have desire you are called to the work. (v. 3)
- B. Faith, Hope, Charity, & Love (v. 5)
 - 1. Faith in ourselves, in what we teach, and in what we do.
 - 2. Hope for our investigators; that they will accept the gospel, and by so doing, better their lives.
 - 3. Charity for all; a willingness to give of our time, effort, or money.
 - 4. Love--an increasing brotherly love for those we teach and come in contact with.
- C. An eye single to the glory of God. (v. 5)

ast.

- 1. God's glory is to bring to pass the immortality and eternal life of man. (Moses 1:39)
 - 2. We are the instruments he uses to accomplish this end.
 - a. The better the instrument, the clearer and sweeter the message.
 - b. Good instruments are always in tune. A symphony orchestra always tunes up before it plays. We must be in tune; we must have the right attitude.
- D. Good Attitude -- our attitude creates the tone of our action.
 - 1. If it is good we will bring people to us and they will want to know more; if it is bad we will turn people away from us.
 - a. For example, if we knock on a door with the attitude, "Oh these Latins, they're just not worth the effort", we will convey that spirit through what we say and will literally 'tune' that person right away from us, but,
 - b. If we knock on that door with the attitude, "These people are sons and daughters of God like I amand I want, with the message I have, to better their relationship to their Father", that person will feel our attitude and may then 'be tuned' to receive the message of the gospel.
 - 2. Without a good attitude the above mentioned attributes of faith, hope, charity, and love cannot be present.
 - a. Can we instill faith in our investigators if we ourselves have a faithless attitude?
 - b. Can we be inthusiastic and desirous to teach if we have an attitude of hopelessness?
 - c. If we do not show in our attitude charity and love for the people our words will be as "sounding brass". (I Cor. 13:1)
 - 3. Can we teach these people the gospel if we ourselves have the attitude that they are not worth teaching?

All Gamma Globulin shots received after June 30, 1966 have been charged to the individual elders. Shots received in El Salvador are \$2.85 and shots received in Guatemala are \$3.65.

Any elder living in one of the mission chapels is charged \$7.50 per month, or 25¢ per day.

All notices received from the office concerning debts should be acknowledged by payment or a note of recognition within 30 days.

The typhoid shot you received in the States was good for one year. It has been advised that we get another one after one year is completed.

Whenever you receive treatment from a doctor, be sure and ASK for the bill, so you can SIGN it. The billing system in Guatemala is different from in the U.S. so this is the only way the mission can know if the elders received treatments or not.

If you receive a bill from the office which you think is incorrect, please send me a letter & I'll be glad to check to see if I've made another mistake.
