



Dear Fellow Missionaries:





TEN LAWS OF PRIESTHOOD LEADERSHIP

There are many powers in this world, but the greatest of all is the power of God who made the world. When His power is given to man to govern His kingdom, it is called the holy priesthood. It is the strongest power and influence in the world ---but may only be such when it is used in accordance with the ten laws of priesthood leadership. Each law is stated, followed by check-questions to stimulate our interest in and our knowledge of the principle.

I - Persuasion

STREET STREET

Persuasion is the chief tool of priesthood leadership. The Savior and all the prophets used this principle widely. It is an effort to convince another through the presentation of ideas, concepts and sound argument. It is the opposite of force. It is used often by truth seekers and those who have a testimony of the truth. These people feel that sound argument is on the side of truth, and they are willing to let others be themselves and take time to think through a proposition. Those who are not sure of the truth or the righteousness of their cause are inclined to demand or compel because they are not sure of themselves and their leadership.

- -- Do you believe that there is a spirit in man and that God through his servants, can give this spirit understanding?
- --Do you believe that man is a free agent and that God holds him responsible for using his agency in choosing good or evil ideas?
- -- Do you respect the dignity of human personality and the right of each to hore choose for himself?
- --Do you avoid manipulative tactics which tend to capture the mind before it has had time to honestly weigh decide, and take independent action. ?

Do you have a passion for sound argument, good doctrine, and clear statements of fact? Do you believe that the way to fight bad ideas is to displace them with good ideas?

- --Do you try to improve your persuasive skill through appropriate stories, parables, and scriptures which communicate through the spirit of God?
- -- Do you have a system for gathering and filing these illustrations and stories for ready reference?

II - Long - suffering

Long-suffering is the second law of leadership. It is willingness to wait, when necessary, for the unfolding of plans and for the reconciliation of ideas, in the interest of the final achievement of worthy goals. Christ exemplified this method in his parable of the wheat and the tares.

Pan American allows Elders going home 44 lbs. of luggage. Cverweight luggage from Guatemala to Salt Lake City costs \$1.20/lb. If you go to the airport and your luggage is overweight, be prepared to pay the overweight charge. You can save yourself a lot of money by sending your extra weight home before you get to the airport. (Guatemala to Los Angeles is \$1.00/lb.)


